Lights and Shadows

"Train Stares"

Last January 2015, riding on a train from Thonburi to Kanchanaburi in Thailand, I got interested with what I saw among people seated while waiting to reach their destinations. Each of them had what I call "train stares". Eyes gazing, wandering and staring on what comes and passes by until the vivid scenes are gone. Sometimes the eyes are a picture of mixed feelings. There are blank eyes. Sleepy eyes. Sad eyes. Happy eyes.

I lost one of my contact lenses at that time. My vision thus became both blurry and clear. Seeing things both as they appear in one eye and how they appear blurred in the other. But I stared nonetheless.

The train stare is teaching me one lesson. Pictures of life pass by. Clear and unclear. The beautiful part about this experience is you may still see what is yet to come. There are things that will remain unseen though. There is more to see in life. Both the lonely and the good. For as long as you keep staring, you won't lose sight of what will appear beautiful.

Life cannot always be melancholic. Sitting in front of me were two people. They looked like a father and daughter. I was secretly staring at them. They talked to each other as their eyes stared closely on things they saw. They smiled and laughed. And they stopped. They had opposite stares. Then they gazed towards each other's direction with gentle glances. Finally, the young girl caught me staring at them. She gave me a cute smile as I gave mine first.

I will never forget what I saw on the train... the stares I had are my stairs to hope, faith and love. These are my bullets for my dreams amidst my fears...
